

## PRESENTS: High Probability Strategies for Managing Student Behaviors in the Classroom

**Dr. Terrance Scott** 

Terrance Scott is a Professor and Distinguished University Scholar at the University of Louisville where he directs the Center for Academic and Behavior Research. Terrance M. Scott, PhD, began his special education career as a counselor in a residential treatment center for adjudicated

adolescent boys. After receiving his master's degree in special education he taught in self-contained classrooms and directed public school programs for students with emotional and behavioral disorders.

Terrance has authored more than 70 published articles, book chapters, and training media in the areas of behavioral disorders and behavioral support systems and is a past editor of the professional journal Beyond Behavior. In 2004, he received the Distinguished Early Career Award from the Research Division of the International Council for Exceptional Children. His main research interests are related to students with challenging behavior, with a special focus on school-wide prevention, effective instruction, functional behavior assessment, and effective classroom and behavior management.
